## **Rick Chaffin – Asst. City Manager, City of McKinney**

Rick Chaffin has been the Assistant City Manager of McKinney since Dec 4, 2006 after having served as a city administrator in Roswell, GA. Chaffin oversees McKinney's Public Safety, Development Services, Public Works and Parks & Recreation Departments.

Additionally, Chaffin has served as city manager in three communities. He was city manager in Griffin, Ga., a rapidly growing area south of Atlanta, from 1998 to 2000; in Mount Pleasant, Texas, from 1993-1998; and Lampasas, Texas, from 1990 to 1993. He is a past president of the Texas City Manager's Association (Region 5).

Chaffin has a Master of Urban Affairs degree from Virginia Tech University and a Bachelor of Science in Political Science from the University of Texas-Tyler. Chaffin also served in U.S. Army Intelligence from 1978-1982, during which he was based at the National Security Agency in Ft. Meade, Md., and Wurzburg, Germany.

## **Paul Harris Foundation**

The founder of Rotary Paul Harris started the first Rotary Club in 1905. Today there are 532 districts worldwide and has over 1.2 million members. The Rotary Foundation was formed by the original founders in Chicago and the first project was building a very nice Out House out side city hall, which at that time had no bathroom facilities. I'll bet that kept the meeting to a minimum.

Out of that first project has grown one of the largest philanthropic programs in the world totaling \$2.03 billion in 2008. Contributions made to the foundation come from the membership and each years giving is not available for distribution back to the clubs for three years. This allows the foundation to continue to grow from the interest earned from the principle and new donation.

As an example last years giving to the foundation was \$227.5 million and in three years that amount of money will be available to the clubs for special programs like Eradicating Polio and the money is all interest.

One of Rotary's largest contributors to the foundation are Bill and Malinda Gates and that money is specially ear marked for the eradication of Polio. To date they have contributed \$355 million.

Programs that are funded by the foundation are, Polio Plus; Health, Hunger and humanity; Matching Grants (for club projects); District Simplified Grants (also used at the club level); Volunteer Service Grants (Supporting Rotarians travel on special projects); Rotary World Peace Fellowships (provide master's level degrees in Peace and Conflict Resolution); Ambassadorial Scholarships (sponsors students to study in a foreign country); Rotary Grants for University Teachers (allowing them to teach in developing countries); and Group Study Exchange (provides the opportunity for Non Rotarians to view other countries).

## Maasai warrior hopes to work for diplomacy

When Wilson Kimeli Naiyomah returned home to Kenya months after witnessing the 9/11 attacks in New York City, he found that most of his fellow Maasai, a nomadic warrior tribe, had only a vague understanding of the events of that day.

Naiyomah, an incoming Rotary World Peace Fellow, shared firsthand accounts with the East African tribe, using the oral tradition it has relied upon for years. Deeply moved by his story, Maasai elders felt compelled to do something to help.

That something turned out to be a decision to send a herd of cows to the United States as a display of sympathy and regret.

Naiyomah has collaborated with award-winning author Carmen Agra Deedy on [14 Cows for America](#), an illustrated children's book about his tribe's response, which received international

attention. The book explains how cows are sacred to Maasai and valued above all other possessions.

"The cow is a symbol of life for us," says Naiyomah "What happened that day was devastating to me."

Although the cows were never shipped to the United States -- State Department officials decided it would cost more than the value of the herd to import them -- the tribe decided to keep them for the Americans, setting the cows apart and vowing never to slaughter them.

"The story focuses on healing and solution," says Naiyomah. "I think children can best understand that, because their hearts are so innocent. The future of a more compassionate world starts with them."

In February, Naiyomah will attend the [Rotary Center for International Studies in peace and conflict resolution](#) at the University of Queensland in Australia.

"Rotary International answered my prayers to belong to an organization that embodies what I silently believe in my heart: that using compassion can help solve problems," he says. "Rotarians are ordinary people taking extraordinary actions to foster relations with countries around the world."

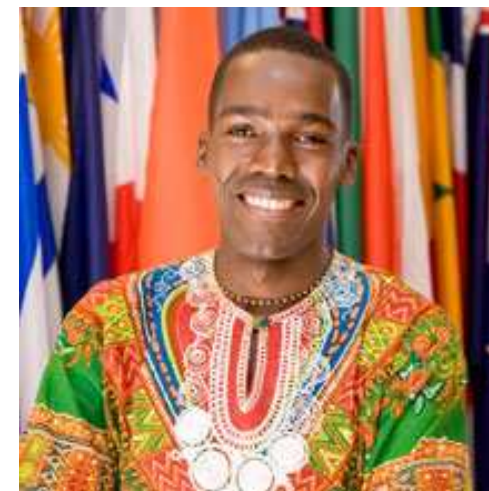
Naiyomah says he hopes the peace studies program will help him find ways to promote peace.

The 9/11 attacks "showed me there's something very wrong with world relations," he says. "There is something lacking in diplomacy that I want to find out."

Naiyomah believes world leaders need to practice "compassionate diplomacy," valuing the lives of people over political expediency.

"Compassionate diplomacy must start by understanding and approaching conflicts with a caring aspect," he says. "Yes, one person can make a difference in the world. But only if they see themselves as the world, not as individuals."

Chosen as the state of Georgia's selection for the [2009 National Book Festival](#), *14 Cows for America* goes on sale 1 August. Naiyomah says all proceeds from the book will benefit victims of the 9/11 attacks.
